Created a Dig Pink campaign that raised over \$12,000 and earned three philanthropic awards. As part of our club's leadership team, we've directed clinics, leagues, and showcases serving hundreds annually, mentored coaches, built inclusive programming, and guided athletes through the recruiting process—helping shape confident, competitive young women and young men on and off the court.

I hope to expand into nationwide camps, mentor young coaches, and create more opportunities for underserved communities. Long-term, I want to open my own multi-sport facility, empowering athletes of all levels and backgrounds through skill development, culture-building, and community engagement.



Which coaches have influenced you the most?

John Cook, Mary Wise, and Joe Felipe have all had a profound impact on my coaching journey in different ways. Cook's ability to build a championship culture rooted in discipline and tradition is something I deeply admire. Wise has been a powerful inspiration as a woman leading at the highest level, paving the way for so many of us. And Felipe, my high school coach, taught me the value of hard work, pride, and passion. Over my 16-year coaching career, every coach I've met—regardless of background—has left a mark on who I am today.
